<u>Development and Presentation of of an Ethical Dilemma Case Scenario</u> (All Objectives) 30% Individual students will develop a detailed ethical dilemma case scenario. The case scenario must include sufficient information for an ethics committee to use in making a determination related to the subject matter of the dilemma.

Research Paper (All Objectives) *SEA

30%

Students will prepare a scholarly paper on a chosen topic that focusing on ethical issues related to the topic. The faculty must approve the topic. A crucial aspect to how these papers will be evaluated is the *articulation of a strong thesis statement that is supported by a cogent argument*. Arguments cannot be solely controversial, but must derive from a clear, well-supported evaluation of the literature. Students are expected to follow APA 7th edition.

Weekly Discussions (All Objectives)

30%

Students will review current literature on ethical topics and participate in select weeks within a discussion board. *Students must be able to guide the discussion about the ethical issues and underlying principles of ethics challenged by the issue.* All posts should be written with clarity and precision using correct English grammar: mechanics (punctuation) and usage (sentence structure and vocabulary), and provide appropriate citations following APA 7th edition.
