This course is designed to explore the relationship between laws and public policy and the impact that they have on administrative leaders. It draws on the base of research and theory of process in law and public policy through the study of current issues. Topics include Non Discrimination, academic integrity, Title IX, the American Disabilities Act, free speech, the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, hazing, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act and due process.

Goal A: Students will examine policies, programs, and processes that impact higher education systems and the people within those systems.
